About VUSU

Victoria University Student Union (VUSU) is the peak representative student body at Victoria University, Melbourne, Australia. VUSU represents and supports all students at Victoria University (VU). The stated objectives of VUSU are to provide a range of representation and general services to a student population of approximately 40,000 across all campuses of the university.

VUSU provides representation and advocacy to all VU students. Student representatives often provide support to students when needed, and when students have complaints and grievances against Victoria University. VUSU representatives lobby the University for inclusive services that benefit all students. VUSU representatives are elected annually by the student body. Elections are fundamental to the democratic nature of the organisation. Participation rates in VUSU elections vary from year to year; in 2017 approximately 5% of enrolled students voted in the election, a high percentage of participation relative to other Victorian universities.

VUSU conducts Board and Executive meetings to facilitate informed discussion with the aim of making decisions. Mobile information booths and surveys conducted via the website and social media channels facilitate the exchange of information between VUSU representatives and the students they represent. Forums and symposiums with staff and students are an opportunity for students to come and voice their views on issues they face.

VUSU is affiliated to the National Union of Students (NUS). The NUS is the peak student representative body in Australia. It has over 600,000 members within Australian tertiary institutions. VUSU is a proud member of NUS and values the contribution it makes to further the interests of students. Each year VUSU sends delegates to the National NUS Conferences. Those delegates take part in the democratic process of formulating NUS policy and electing NUS office bearers.

Most of all I would like to thank each and every one of you who has been involved with the union from the bottom of my heart for an extraordinary year. Key Achievements

This year VUSU has had a few main focusses and the team has worked extremely hard to make these goals possible. VUSU aims to improve the student experience by providing students with the support, the fun and the safety they need to thrive. This year has seen a range of fantastic initiatives come to life including our VUSU VIP Program, accessibility of events and the VU and VUSU relationship remaining strong.

VUSU Loyalty Program (VUSU VIP)

In last year's annual report, you will see in the president Jill's report, that she wanted a loyalty program to be created to increase student participation and the idea was brought to life this year by the hard work of VUSU. The new loyalty program was called VUSU VIP and over the past 8 months of bringing it to life, we have had over 85 sign ups at a \$20 membership fee. When you buy the membership, you also receive a goodie bag with a keep cup, bottle opener, notepad, glasses etc. This is not only a great way to market VUSU, but it is a fantastic way to involve students on a continuous basis at all VUSU events. We also have nearly 40 signed up volunteers that regularly help out at events that VUSU holds.

Accessible events

This year has also been a huge year for VUSU in terms of accessibility. We are proud to present that every event we have held this year has been an accessible event. This was one of VUSUs key goals for the year, to make all events accessible and we are very pleased to note that we have reached this goal. For example, every year we have held a VUSU boat party, but this year we scrapped it because this event was not accessible for students who have certain medical conditions. We are committed as a union and as a university as a whole to making everything accessible to all students, which includes all events by VUSU. We will continue to stick to our promise and goal to ensure that all VUSU events in the future are kept accessible.

VUSU and VU Relationship (Block Model)

This year we have seen quite a bit of focus on the implementation of the 'Block Model' beyond first year. In order for VUSU to adequately address all issues and student concerns, it is important for VUSU to maintain a healthy and prominent relationship with VU to gain relevant insight into the developments of the block model. We have tried very hard to make this happen with the monthly meetings between the executive of VUSU and executive members of the university, however, problems still arose when VUSU was not made aware of certain



events/forums/proceedings that were taken place. To resurrect this issue we have endeavored to stick our fingers in all pies of university levels which means we will have connections and information coming from all levels of governance and therefore kept informed with all things VU. The relationship between VUSU and VU is very important in VUSU's aims to adequately represent the student body.

Women's Officer

2018 began a little differently to my predecessors before me. I began this year as the elected Women's Officer at VUSU. The few months in this role was amazing. VUSU partnered with Respect and Responsibility in creating the Mural – "We are stronger than Fear" at Footscray Park. This mural promotes Preventing Violence Against Women, with the painting of this mural contributed by staff and students at Victoria University. The mural was created on International Women's Day, where VUSU held refreshments for all participants. The 1st of August 2018 marked one year since the release of the Australian Human Rights Commission's "Change the Course Report", which detailed the prevalence of sexual assault and sexual harassment on university campuses.

"The Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Marcia Devlin, acknowledged the pain and hurt suffered by those who have experienced sexual assault and affirmed the University's harassment, and commitment to working with staff, students and the community to change the sexist attitudes that underpin violence and discrimination. VU Student Union's Cat Abourizk, who was Women's Officer at the time of the mural painting, affirmed its symbolic importance in reclaiming a space for women on campus, and creating a message of strength and resistance. Professor Devlin then unveiled the mural, dedicating it to "everyone in our community who has been affected by gender-based violence, through their life's journey."

On International Women's Day VUSU also marched in the International Women's Day March in Melbourne CDB supporting equality.

Further, I worked closely on the Bystander Awareness Module launched for Victoria University, continuing this work on further modules being created, including one regarding Consent.











General Secretary

I won't go overboard in details in this report, however I will highlight the key activities throughout the year.

Working with Colleges

I worked tirelessly to be the student voice and ultimately made some big changes for students. We worked closely this year with many of the Colleges at VU in supporting students throughout their studies and for the future coming into Block Model.



Planning Days

We orchestrated many planning activities where the Student Union Office-bearers came together with VU staff, students and vusuteers to plan events and ideas going forward. This proved to be great team-bonding also.

Learning and Teaching Quality Committee

I was appointed as a Student by Higher Education Coursework to the LTQC. This committee has been great in expressing views of the students, as well as understanding the inside workings of regulating the quality of learning and teaching at VU.



VUSU HANGS

VUSU Hangs was a new initiative (will be discussed in the Activities Report) developed by myself and other members of the Student

Union. VUSU Hangs were held regularly at all campuses of VU, where we were able to meet students, provide free food and drink, and develop further ideas for students. It was a place where students could learn about the VUSU, as well as for members of the VU Community to join, to advertise, promote or help out.

NUS Education Conference

Education Conference was a great experience, bringing many new VUSU-teers to also experience. It was a wonderful way to see how other Student Unions run within their Unions and to also meet new people and learn. The week was great in not only getting to know other people from other unions, but to also engage and know more about the people in our own. A very successful week.



Constitution and Regulations Updates

Over the course of the year, myself and Holly have worked on proposing amendments to the VUSU Constitution, as well as creating and updated regulations and policies. I have worked



tirelessly on ensuring that our Constitution and Regulations are adjusted to meet the needs of the Student Union, but to also protect the Student Union and its members.

VUSUteers

Organising the VUSUteer's has been my role alongside Hannah Nadin. The VUSUteer program has proved to be of huge success, with VUSUteer's not only enjoying their volunteer work, but enjoying the Student Union and what it has to offer. I am excited to see our VUSUteer's continue their time at VUSU.



Student Appeals

I, and other members of the Executive have sat on many Student Appeals throughout the year. This role is a very important part of ensuring students are supported as this procedure applies to all students or other eligible persons who are subject to an adverse decision in relation to, Student misconduct, Student complaints, An admission decision, Academic progress; and any other decision relating to students which the University is required by law to provide an appeals process for and which is not already covered by another appeals process. The University has expressed on multiple occasions its gratitude to the VUSU for engaging in this process.

Council Dinner

Attending the Council Dinner with Holly was a great opportunity to meet members of the University we wouldn't normally meet on a day-to-day basis. This event allowed students and student leaders to express their opinions on matters within the University setting. Both Holly and I were well received, with many actions taken by our words.

Student Leadership Awards Ceremony

I was incredibility fortunate to be the recipient of the Raj Kannan Leadership Scholarship for 2018. The Student Leadership Awards recognise and celebrate students across Victoria University for their leadership roles and outstanding achievements in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The criteria is to provide evidence of when you have demonstrated leadership that benefited your fellow students and the VU community, as well as to provide evidence of participation in causes that champion social inclusion, cultural diversity, and equity. Not only this, our College of Law and Justice Society (Dictum) was the recipient of Club of the Year under these awards. Members of the College of Arts and Education Society were also recipients of Individual Awards.



Integrity Module

Other members and I of the VUSU engaged with the University in assisting the creation of an Integrity Module, addressing what academic integrity is and why it is important. This is planning to be launched early next year.



Overall








Education Report – Aleks Spiric

My name is Aleks Spiric, and I have been lucky enough to be elected the Vice President of Education at Victoria University Student Union for 2018. This role has been in every aspect enjoyable, often stressful, and in no doubt an enriching, satisfying experience immersed with learning curves. Additionally, I have made connections with many new people professionally, as well as developed lifelong friends through collaboration and shared visions.



The start of my term was very daunting, as I felt there was so much to do and I wasn't sure where to start. The first big project team wide for VUSU was preparation for O-Week, which I was a central organiser of. This event is so important in introducing ourselves to new university students so that they are well aware of the events and support we offer them throughout their studies.

At the start of each semester I released a textbook grant. This grant consisted of a number of Co-Op Book Shop vouchers valued at \$100 each. The aim of this was to support students financially in purchasing any necessities relevant to their studies, but also to gather data on the demographic of students attending each campus and establish ways the VUSU can support students as we expand across all campuses. This resulted in very grateful students that were able to purchase expensive textbooks, but also valuable feedback that VUSU had gained from various students.

An early project I worked on was with VU Scout on their app. I, along with the Welfare Officer had been meeting with staff from VU Scout to help them develop their app by mapping out the VU campuses and locate all bathrooms, central and accessible entrances to add to an easy to read map within the application. The vision here was to offer all students immediate and accessible assistance in navigating the campuses – this was particularly in the best interest of first year university students.

During my term I have been able to gauge that some facilities within the university needed upgrading and broadening. An example of this is the Creative Cloud Suite that I spoke to library staff about uploading to more computers on both Footscray Park Campus and Nicholson Campus. Media and Arts students have been limited in their usage of these programs due to compatibility issues they experience between Mac and PC. I felt that offering these programs across both operating systems erased the issues students have been facing



with software compatibility. This was ultimately a success, with PCs, as well as Macs, receiving Creative Cloud programs on Nicholson and Footscray Park campuses.

I made it my mission to give traction to student feedback, so a lot of my events involved gaining consistent feedback from students on relevant university matters. The past couple of years have proven to be central to the Block Model of study that received a lot of contention. I created organised free pizza events where students would come and offer anonymous feedback and would receive a free slice of pizza or two. This type of event was also held online with prizes offered to students on all campuses. These events were extremely successful as they were assessable to lots of students – particularly those who lived far from their campuses. The mountains of feedback and queries we received were then used to inform the Symposiums that I facilitated at the end of semester 1 and semester 2.

As one of VUSU's biggest events, the VU & VUSU Symposiums were an honour to facilitate. I found this type of event extremely beneficial and important as the university's greatest stakeholders (the students) are able to share their thoughts and concerns, and also ask questions in a safe and professional environment. The second Symposium event this year was live streamed on our Facebook page and I think that method was valuable as we were able to engage students from other campuses in asking questions and offering feedback. The panels included Victoria University staff that were from relevant fields to the established themes of the event. We were very lucky to have support from university staff in organising a donated laptop (from VU Procurement) for a random student attendee of the event. We have received positive feedback on our Symposium events numerous times and I had been so excited to hear back from students and staff about the event.

I have also wanted to get sleep lounges in places across campuses – this is something a lot of students who travel far have requested. It has loosely gone to university staff however it is something that I wish I had pushed more in my remaining weeks in VUSU. This is something that has been brought up in the lead up to our Symposium events, as well as within them.

I have also been lucky enough to attend the NUS National Conference in December of 2017, which was a great experience in gathering the issues that we face as students on a national level and being able to witness and be a part of debates and vote on policies that best benefit us as students. During this time, I have been able to meet many student union representatives from other universities across Australia – wherein I was able to share and develop goals and ideas about my term as Education Officer.



During my term I have worked closely with our Welfare Officer in organising and funding student events like the Mental Health First Aid training and Responsible Service of Alcohol course. I have also been a part of the Mental Health Plan reference group at the university, where I was able to give input about what should be considered regarding mental health and how to change the stigma around seeking help and talking about mental health in general. Additionally, I have advocated for and supported students with queries relating to their experiences at university – both social and academic. I also felt as Education Officer it is important to support student activity and outcomes and I did this by helping advertise student led fundraisers or research projects through our online platforms and offering advice, as well as attending exam revivers at the end of each semester.

In the conclusion of my term I feel like I have accomplished many things, measured by what I have been able to offer the students at Victoria University. I do, however, wish I had more time to advocate for more change within student experience. I have no doubt that the Vice President of Education for 2019 will continue to pursue my values in advocating for students and developing a university that offers exceptional academic, social and financial support for its students. I would like to wish the new team the best of luck and endless congratulations on being elected to represent and advocate for students for 2019.

Being a part of VUSU 2018 has been an honour.

Welfare Report - Amy Marks

If you don't read beyond this sentence, in short, running the welfare department of VUSU for 2018 has been incredible - incredibly difficult at times but also always incredibly rewarding.

For O-week welfare ran a chill out table featuring adult colouring-in and play doh at most campuses for those who found the day 'too much' and needed some space to relax. This initiative saw particular success at the Footscray Nicholson campus where many students chose to participate. At other campuses where we were logistically able to run the activity, not as many students partook in the alternate activity but those who did appreciated it.

Following this we ran a bigger and better 'Chill Out Zone' at 'Step Up Day' an annual evening event predominantly for incoming students at the end of orientation week. This area featured giant jenga, a playstation area and various other board games as well as bean bags and a general space to chill out as an alternative to the physical activities. This space was appreciated by many students who were quite shy or needed to take a rest.

Then Welfare and Education did an accessibility audit of City Queens and Footscray Park campus, this was for a now, unfortunately, semi-abandoned collaboration with VU scout.

Welfare started student-facing events for the year with a visit from the 2018 Australian Youth Representative to the United Nations, Amos Washington at City Flinders where we heard from a small group of students between 18-25 about how young people are perceived currently and their views, goals and concerns for the future. This event confirmed welfare was on track for the year as a common theme was that mental health, access to opportunities and skills were key wants relevant in these students lives.

Then it was on to planning the always popular free breakfast stall, however, in the midst of this it came to the VUSU executive's' attention that the VUSU lounge at City Queen had been converted to a learning hub without VUSU's knowledge. To support students on campus and rally against this undisclosed change with less than a week's notice, welfare contacted the Red Frogs (redfrogs.org.au) to help us run a pancake flip and a few days later we ran our event with several volunteers, toppings and pancakes provided by Red Frogs free of charge. Later it was realised that this was the first-ever on campus pancake flip for Red Frogs Victoria. This initiative provided many students with a warm snack on a cold day and gathered numerous signatures in protest of the location of the Learning Hub.



When it was time to launch the free breakfast stall, it was decided to use Melbourne-based fruit supplier, Fruit2Work (fruit2work.com.au) to supply the fresh fruit when possible, not only did this partnership ensure VUSU got market-fresh fruit for students but that we supported the community as Fruit2Work provides employment and rehabilitation opportunities for those just released from prison to help them reintegrate into the community.

As the free breakfasts continued, Welfare along with events and the College of Arts and Education Society held a free lunchtime comedy event in partnership with the Melbourne International Comedy Festival's Comedy Zone Asia programming.

Welfare also had a consistent behind-the-scenes presence throughout various VUSU events during the year advocating for more physical accessibility by making signs for the accessible entrances to the symposium, advocating for flat venues with accessible bathrooms and alternative but equal experiences for those who may be neurodivergent or just prefer a quieter space. Outside of VUSU Welfare also joined the accessible event and mental health committees for the broader VU community.

Welfare also investigated the possibility of having VUSU events interpreted into Auslan, however, due to the current national shortage of Auslan interpreters this year that was not possible, however we now have information and awareness of services available to us if we need to utilise an interpreter in the future.

Welfare along with the LGBTIQA+/Pride Officers throughout the year also advocated for more freeform dress codes at formalised VUSU events such as the ball.

Welfare held three practical workshops this year - Auslan classes (in conjunction with the College of Arts and Education) Physical First Aid and Mental Health First Aid, not only were these courses heavily subsidised for VU students, In the cases of both mental and physical first aid, VUSU saved students roughly \$100 or so dollars depending on where they hypothetically would have completed the course, when including educational resources, food and in-class training. Mental Health First Aid was a particular highlight with students giving exceptionally positive feedback. On top of the savings for students generally, VUSU was also able to award at least one scholarship per workshop that covered all the costs of the course to a deserving and/or highly motivated student through an online application process administered through vustudentunion.com and promoted through Facebook this initiative received universally positive feedback from VUSU executives, VU staff and most importantly, students as it enabled students who generally may not have the financial means to complete this course, an opportunity to participate and gain skills. In particular with the mental health first aid, we were able to provide two scholarships which resulted in one being given to a law and business student based at City Queen. They



are now a qualified as Mental Health First Aider for the next three years. Not only is this a direct benefit to the student but it will also hopefully bring awareness to the importance of mental health to disciplines outside the health and educational sectors.

Going into the second semester, Welfare held a silent disco in support of Mental Health at Footscray Park. As well as a collaborative event with Student Life based around the footy finals featuring Wheelchair AFL to bring more diverse and accessible events to the student body.

Finally, welfare ran a survey about students experience with car parking at VU as a response to multiple complaints about the pricing hike due to the recent implementation of the easy park app and lack of parking overall. VUSU received almost 200 responses in less than 24 hours. This data has now been passed onto Daniel Nicholson who will utilise it going forward into 2018.

The above is truly just the surface of what was achieved both by myself in the Welfare role and VUSU as a collective unit. Thank you all for this experience it has truly been an honour to be able to work to improve the awesome VU community.



The Public Officer of VUSU Inc. declares that the Union is not a reporting entity and that this special purpose financial report should be prepared in accordance with the accounting policies outlined in Note 1 to the financial statements.

1. The financial statements fairly present the Union's financial position as at 30 June 2018 and there are reasonable grounds to believe that the Union will be able to pay its debts as and when they become due and payable.

It should be noted that most VUSU operations and activities are funded by the University. The University has allocated funds to spend on activities and operations as determined by VUSU. The Financial Statements do not include this sum of money, however information is provided and solely prepared for the benefit of student at the annual general meeting.

EXTERNAL ACCOUNTS

The Balance sheet and Profit and Loss Statement represent the external account held by the Union. The Union operates and external account with Westpac Bank.
